We helped save GM and others want to take credit

My thanks to everyone who got out to vote on November 2. Results were not what we wanted. Our work will be very touch with Republitough with Republi-



cans winning a major-ity in the national and state legislatures. Attacks on labor issues, such as the unemployment compensation extension, will be on the line.

Our membership has gone through a lot of changes which were necessary for the survival of GM and the UAW across our nation. With GM emerging from bankruptcy and now the IPO (Initial Public Offering) of stock, it has that Public Offering) of stock, it has everybody's attention across the nation because now the government could sell their share of stocks to start the process of repayment of the \$50 billion dollar ownership of GM stock, as reported by Tom Krisher of the Associated Press in

Tom Krisher of the Associated Press in the November 18 issue of the Lansing State Journal.

With everyone excited over the turnaround by the auto company, many will take credit. But the next report from Bloomberg Agency by Craig Trudell on November 19 reported that Senator Bob Corker says he is vindicated by GM's IPO for pressing demands on automakers. Corker said in the article that he knows he's not popular in Michigan. that he knows he's not popular in Michi-gan for his involvement in the transaction. I want our membership to know that Senator Bob Corker is no friend of labor, nor should he take any credit for

making necessary steps for the automakers' success.

Our membership in the UAW took action in October, 2005 on a midterm special agreement upon recommendation by then President Ron Gettelfinger and Vice President Ron Gettelfinger and Vice President Rockett Steps (1997). that action was necessary to save the health insurance for our retired workers. At that time, GM's market shared had dropped from 41 percent in 1985 to

26 percent in May of 2005, with a credit rating of junk status (non-investment) and losses of \$4.2 billion in North American and a forecast that GM would suf-fer losses in 2006 and 2007.

In the 1970's GM had 490,000 active workers and 90,000 retirees. By 2005 there were 110,000 active workers and over 519,000 retired workers!

ers and over 519,000 retired workers!

To save the health insurance for our retired members, a VEBA Trust was agreed to and funded by a \$3 billion payment from GM, with retirees paying \$10 for single and \$21 for family contributor single and \$2.7 for faimly contribu-tion. Active workers would contribute the deferral of pay increases of \$1 per hour, plus future COLA deferrals of two cents per hour. In the 2007 agreement (which will appear on the Labor News website, lansinglabornews.org), entrywebsite, tainsingtatorinews.org), entry-level new hires moved to \$14 an hour, with no defined pension plan, no health care in retirement. You can see that we as UAW mem-bers helped save GM and the UAW, not Senator Bob Corker. Some folks would

like to drive a wedge between our ac-tive and retired members. So let me be clear: we will always protect our retired and active workers

Eligible surving spouses will receive 65%, or an amount ranging from \$151 to \$455.

Wow! What a ride this fall has been! We've had a mid-term election that didn't turn out quite like we wished, a

major investment announcement at our Lansing Grand River plant, and now GM is once again a pres-ence in the stock market! All of these are tremendously impor-tant to anyone who makes their living in the auto industry.



First, the national and state mid-term First, the national and state mid-term elections. The Republicans rode a tidal wave of anxiety and apprehension to a nationwide "Redwash." Everywhere you looked on November 2. Republicans seemed to be making gains. At the state seemed to be making gains. At the state level Michigan has undergone a huge change. The GOP now holds a majority in all areas, administrative, legislative, and judicial. What this will mean to those of us in the UAW remains to be seen, but I expect a hard road ahead.

New Governor-elect Rick Snyder made mention in his campaign that the wages and benefits of state workers needed to be looked at. I believe his statement was to the effect of finding a long-term solution to the "problem" of wages and benefits. He has stated he doesn't want to keep coming back to these employees with nickel-and-dime solutions. His statements lead me to be lieve that his "solution" could mean mas sive pay and benefit cuts to our brothers and sisters in public service. This on top of the cuts that they have already experienced!

And we can be assured that with their gains the GOP agenda of making Michigan a "right to work" state will be attempted! Do yourself a favor and investigate this play on words! The "right investigate this play on words! The "right to work" name on this bill means anything but a right to work. It means a right to work for LESS to all middle- and lower-income wage earners. Contact your representatives regardless of their party affiliation and tell them NO on "right to work!"

Many of them lost money on the "old" GM when it entered bankruptcy. All I can say is remember who you depend on for your income. Good, bad, or indifferent we all have to accept the fact that GM needs to be successful for us to be successful.

Whether it's per-forming our job, buying stock, or acting as ambassadors for the company—selling our family, friends and neighbors on the product—we have to make GM successful! 


