Greetings to you and your family. I hope this edition of The Lansing Labor News finds you well.

This fall has been extremely busy for all. Thank you to all who took the time to participate in the Michigan midterm elections. If you voted, worked the polls, were involved with your local CAP committee, or volunteered, thank you!

For the first time in forty years, the Democrats will control the House, Senate, and Governorship! What does that mean? We should be able to right all the wrongs that have been forced upon us all. Here are just a few things we should do immediately:

- Restore collective bargaining rights
- Fix our payroll deduction issues for dues collection and V-CAP deductions
- Repeal the Retiree Tax
- Repeal Right to Work

Ten years ago, the Snyder group, in the dark of late night, rammed Right to Work through the legislature. He said it wasn't on his radar, but he signed it anyway. It is time these free loaders pay their fair share of union dues and stop getting a free ride on the backs of our UAW members and thumbing their noses at all the hard work and dedication of our retired workers.

Another "gift" given to our retirees, both current and future, by the Snyder Administration: The retiree pension tax. Remember, this tax went directly from our retirees' pockets into the pockets (tax breaks) of corporations and big businesses, NOT to improve one single road, bridge, or infrastructure in Michigan.

We have done the work to elect our legislators and now it is the time to put pressure on them to do the right thing for our retired workers. REPEAL THE RETIR-EE PENSION TAX!

Here are some of the current retiree numbers across our Region:

Region 1D has 84,919 retirees. 48,453 of them are currently paying retiree dues, 2,586 are paying above \$3.00. That is about 57% of our retired workers paying dues. Congratulations to our Region's retirees, as you are #1 in the country, far above the national average of retirees paying dues. Thank you!

For those who have their healthcare covered by the Retiree Medical Benefit Trust (RMBT), there are currently approximately 600,000 retirees in the Trust. Only 59,000 active employees remain eligible to join the RMBT upon their retirement. The Trust re-

mains very healthy and will continue to provide great healthcare coverage. RMBT is in the process of sending out cards explaining the change to Optum Rx for mailorder prescriptions.

I have had many phone calls and questions regarding rumors and statements made pertaining to our retirees and the Big 3 national agreements in 2023. I will attempt to clear some of these up.

First and foremost, all past and present bargaining groups, from the international leaders to the elected top negotiation committees, have attempted to bargain improvements for our retirees. I will attempt to somewhat explain, realizing that there is a lot of history, legal documents, and information on the ability to bargain on behalf of retirees.

Section 8(d) of the National Labor Relations Act (NLRA) provides that the parties must meet and bargain over wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment. The National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) has interpreted that and defined the subjects of bargaining as follows:

The subjects of bargaining are defined as:

- Mandatory Subjects These are subjects that directly impact wages, hours, and working conditions. This list is extremely lengthy and contains the subjects which the parties must bargain over if a proposal is made by either party. Some examples are rates of pay, overtime, subcontracting and pension benefits for active employees.
- Permissive Subjects These are subjects that are not directly related to the work. They fall outside of the mandatory subjects. This list can be infinitely long. The parties may agree to bargain over these subjects, but are not required to by law, and can refuse to discuss them without fear of an unfair

labor practice charge. It is also a violation to strike over a permissive subject of bargaining. Some examples are neutrality agreements, designation of a party's bargaining representative, use of union label/flag, and pension benefits for already retired members.

As I stated above, national bargaining teams always want to make improvements for our retirees. The fact is, however, for the last couple of decades, corporations have taken the position that retirees are no longer considered employees, as they do not perform work for the company and have signed retirement papers severing their employment with said company. These companies make it clear that they are not willing to discuss benefits for retirees.

I commit to you, I will do everything in my power to push for improvements for retirees, but keep in mind, the law is not on our side. If someone is trying to convince you otherwise, please feel free to call me and we can discuss and go over the legal documents.

In closing, I would like to thank all

Hello 1753 Union Family,

Happy holidays. While this is a joyful time for many people to spend with the ones they love, remember that for some folks, this time of year is a struggle. Please be sensitive to the different ways we all experience this season.

Remember to take some time to look at the posting for information about our Local 1753 upcoming elections for the unexpired term in this edition of the Lansing Labor News. You can also find postings in the plant and at our Union Hall.

Additionally, keep an eye out in mid -January for a possible ballot to vote in a run-off election for our UAW International Executive Board. As I am writing this column, the results have not yet been officially decided, but it is likely that many of the races will require a run-off, since a candidate must receive a majority (not just a plurality) to win. If this election does require a run-off of any of the candidates, and you do receive a

run-off ballot, it should be returned before the end of February. I hope that you voted in the Union election in November, as well as in the U.S. mid-terms. Both of these play a big role in the lives of GM and UAW workers.. As you can see, our elected officials have played a huge role in the recent railroad workers' fight for basic benefits, such as sick leave, safe conditions, disciplinary attendance, hiring, work-life balance, and salary. If the workers lose this battle, it jeopardizes all of our Unions. When politicians prioritize the corporation's billions of dollars in profits over the dignity of workers, we all lose.

Speaking of jobs and benefits, GM is taking strides to be more innovative with the introduction of SEEGRID machines, which pull trains throughout the plant. These machines are predicted to replace the jobs of the human workers who currently do this task in GM plants. While the machines are not going away and jobs will continue to be eliminated by technological advances, the people who work in our plant also contribute to job losses. When one employee does the work of others, or takes on extra duties outside of their classification or current assignment, this provides management with the rationale to merge job titles and cut back on hiring. This also undermines the work of the bargaining team to advocate for job classifications and assignments that are sustainable and fair. When Union workers do more work without being compensated, it results in a defacto wage cut for all of us.

Protect our right to an honest day's work for an honest day's pay by doing only the jobs assigned to you under your classification! "Favors" for the management team or the corporation disrespects the legacy of the Union members who have fought hard to ensure that we are not overworked and underpaid (like the railroad workers!). This has been a long and hard fight – and it is one we must continue to fight.

And on the subject of hard-won fights, one of our greatest allies in the fight to ensure workers' rights is the National Labor Relations Board, which enforces the agreements Unions like ours enter into with industries. Without this oversight, corporations and managers would be able to completely ignore the rights of workers. The NLRB was established by the National Labor Relations Act to enforce Labor laws related to collective bargaining and to investigate unfair Labor practices. Since 2014, the funding for the NLRB has remained static, meaning that there are fewer resources and fewer staff available and yet, petitions to form a Union increased by 58% in the first half of 2022. Reports of unfair Labor practices also rose by 18%. The NLRB is one of the only agencies with the weight of the law behind them that can combat crimes like retaliation, harassment, intimidation, Union-busting and bad faith bargaining. Take a moment to tell Congress to fund the NLRB with the full \$368 million it needs for its budget. For more information, you can go to https:// aflcio.org/pro-act.

For a fun and entertaining way to learn more about the NLRB and how it defends worker rights, check out the Factually! Podcast with Adam Conover and guest Jennifer Abruzzo. You might remember Adam from his TV series, "Adam Ruins Everything".

As we look forward to 2023, we are fortunate to have our chairperson, Arniece Stephenson, bargaining for the CCAs in the upcoming national contract. So to help get the best National contract we can, I am going to reiterate to Vote for people who are knowledgeable and will actually back the union members. Only do your job assignment as it is outlined in the Job Element Sheet. Start saving money in case we have to do whatever we have to, to get what we deserve/ is fair. Remember that the union is everyone, so do not do things that are Self Serving and go against the contract or other members. I am hoping we all have a prosperous and productive new

It was posted on our plant's Facebook page that help was needed. One of our union brothers who work in our trim shop, Kevin Bell, was a great help. He is what I would call a mechanical guru, aka car nut, aka car enthusiast. He donated 100% of the labor and several members sent money via cash app to purchase the parts. Kevin also went to her home to pick up the car and returned it.

On another occasion, one of our members, Steve McKellar, had a house fire where they sadly lost everything to the fire. I received a message from a member, Scott Zimmerman, General Assembly, Quality, saying he had a donation for Brother McKellar. Brother Zimmerman had trash bags full of clothes, shoes, and coats in great condition. (If I'm being honest, the shoes took up 1 bag because of the size shoe they both wear.) Brother Zimmerman didn't hesitate when he realized they wore the same size and I'll add that he doesn't even know Brother McKellar personally. Without hesitation, he packed up some bags and brought them to work.

We have a member whose son was ill and, in the hospital, long term. A union member in the Paint shop, Jareb Fosket, called me and wanted to brainstorm different fundraising opportunities for this family that he could pursue. He ended up designing a shirt that incorporated everything the little boy likes, the boy's name, and a skywalk that had an entrance into the plant with Wynken, Blynken, and Nod in the background. I assumed that the union sister worked with Brother Fosket in the Paint shop because he was so passionate about helping her. To my surprise, Brother Fosket didn't know the union sister and she doesn't even work in the same shop. Brother Fosket knew she needed help and didn't hesitate.

These 3 members stood up, raised their hands, and rendered aid without hesitation. To them, it was the right thing to do, to the receiver, it meant everything in the world! I know there are several more situations like these and I would never have enough room on this page to list all of them.

It's stories like this that fill my heart with joy. It is my greatest honor and pleasure to represent you as your Vice President. With the year drawing to a close,

we have much to be proud of here at Local 652. As the situation with the ever-present Covid-19 evolved, we were able to start doing those things that we had previously taken for granted. Things like working without the annoyance of a mask or just seeing a person smile. Potlucks with our fellow members at many of the worksites became the norm once again. With parts restraints and staffing issues looming over our heads, we put in the work to meet the high demand for our products. These vehicles are the bread and butter of all our units at the local. The Election Committee successfully conducted local elections with the guidance of the UAW Constitution and state and federal law. Finally, we are happy to see our Local 652 retirees meeting at the hall for luncheons, bingo, and fraternizing.

Along with this positive news, we have a few things to watch as we move toward the new year. LGR has great-selling Cadillac products with enhancements on the way,

but the local members and leaders must keep reminding management that Lansing is the place for new products. The GM Unit members are submitting contract demands as the UAW-GM labor agreement expires on September 15th. Bargaining in 2019 was tough, and 2023 may be more challenging, but we have the membership and the knowhow to get through. The parts and staffing issues are projected to continue, but hopefully, improvement will come later in 2023. Local members and leaders must continue to educate themselves on unionism and work to improve communication. Last but certainly not least, we need to work on setting aside conspiracy theories and mistrust as we navigate this new system of elections in our International Union. With only 15% of the membership voting on the referendum decision and only 11% voting for the IEB elections, I am keeping my fingers crossed that we are only experiencing growing pains. 
Dear Sisters and Brothers,




