## Inform yourself for the election

Another important election year is upon us and your participation is needed.

The next President of the United States will need to make a crucial decision when appointing someone to fill a vacancy on the Supreme Court. Additionally, there are three current jus-



tices who are elderly, making it possible that the next President could fill as many as four seats. Depending on which candidate wins the Presidential race, this appointment will in fact either turn around the injustice done to unions and their members, or cause irreparable damage to the cornerstone of their foundation.

Much of our attention is spent making decisions at the last minute and rightfully so. We wake every morning to our daily routine and proceed to tackle the task at hand. Try as we might to plan our schedules accordingly, sometimes just making plans for the weekend is about as far as we get. Sure, we plan for things like car repairs, unexpected bills and other so called speed bumps in life, but are we giving enough thought to the long term effects from those decisions and whether or not they will be detrimental to our quality of life or the lives of our children and grandchildren?

Even though we don't have the power a President has to appoint someone to the Supreme Court, collectively we are empowered to influence that decision by electing the candidate who will have our best interest in mind when that appointment is made. Unlike the President, we may not have the luxury of cabinet officials, each having their own specialty, each an expert in his or her own field, who advise us on what to do, but we have all the information available in order to do the right thing.

We have more information available at our fingertips than any other generation before us. "Googling" or "Googled It" have become commonplace terms for finding information on anything you want to know. Type a word or phrase in the subject line, and you will be inundated with hundreds of thousands of results over several pages. Instantaneous results, along with the comment section, weigh heavily on our opinion of the information's credibility and accuracy.

We have become dependent on the information highway for every aspect of our daily lives. Addresses, business hours, vacation getaways, information on DIY projects and hobby interests are just a few of the items typed into search engines on a regular basis. Statistics show we spend on average 32 hours a month using the internet. A normal internet user spends around 22% of his or her time on line social networking. 21% of our time is spent on internet searches, 20% reading searched content.

As we know from the information above, we spend the second highest percentage of our time on line searching for items of interest. For instance the subject of local, state and national poli-

## Tips on Personal Savings Plan

Over the past several months, I have been asked questions about the General

Motors Personal Savings Plan (PSP) program provides a way for General Motors employees to invest money toward their future retirement. Although I do not represent PSP, I



can provide you with some general information.

GM employees can sign up for automatic weekly payroll deductions by calling 800-489-4646 or by going online to gmbenefits.com. This is an all-in-one website for benefits and services for current and retired GM employees. It's easy to get started.

For active employees, begin by accessing gmbenefits.com, then choose "active hourly". Choose which benefit you want to review, in this case "Savings Plan". Two choices will come up. Select "PSP Offerings" to log into the system.

For new users, there is a "register now" tab on the right side of the page. Click here to verify your identity and set up a password.

Once registered, you will be able to access and manage all your GM benefits at this one location. You can obtain information, enroll, or make changes. Simply click on the program you are interested in, and follow the prompts. The GM PSP icon will guide you to the Fidelity Net Benefits site.

How much can you save for retirement in 2016? The IRS has an annual contribution limit for retirement savings accounts, so verify your eligibility for contribution deductibility. In 2016, a person 49 and under can contribute \$18,000 to a 401(k) plan, and a person age 50 and older can contribute an additional \$6,000

For those who are just starting to save for retirement, there are many options to choose from, and the Fidelity Net Benefits site has a lot of information to help you with this process. You can manage your contribution and catch-up contribution amounts, enroll in a program to automatically increase your contribution amount annually, and roll over money

from an old 401(k) plan to your current plan.

One advantage to participating in the 401(k) plan is tax deferral. You lower your taxable income now and generally don't pay income tax until you take a distribution from the plan, which for most people is at retirement when they are in a lower tax bracket.

Always read plan rules and understand the tax consequences for any savings plan. Like most investments, you could have charges and penalties under certain circumstances. Review each option's fee information and prospectus. Read the fine print.

Consider your risks before investing by accessing resources on retirement planning, investing and other financial topics.

#### A little Trump goes a long way

arguing that America has lost many of its manufacturing jobs because our trade negotiators aren't smart or tough enough to work out shrewd deals with Mexico, China, Japan, etc. He's promising that if he's elected President he'll bring these jobs home, apparently by reopening negotiations and being "more shrewder" than our current negotiators. A lot easier said than done, Mr. Trump. But it is an example of his strategy to win the White House. Find an angry, disenchanted block of voters and say anything to appeal to them, no substance necessary (and by the way, Trump is not the only GOP candidate to use this tactic)!

Although NAFTA and things like the Trans-Pacific Partnership, now being debated add to the problem of out-sourcing and offshoring our jobs, the simple fact is a company will go wherever they can to realize the most profits. Why pay someone in Michigan a living wage when they can pay slave wages in any number of countries around the world. But headway is being made. Higher wages are being realized by many of these countries, changing the cost balance more in our favor. Along with lower cost energy availability in the US and the advantage of bringing production closer to consumers, over a million manufacturing jobs have been created here in the past six years. Nowhere near our heyday in the 70's, but a step in the right direction. Trump claims he can return many more of these lost jobs by changing trade agreements and tariffs, but with efficiency increases and technological advances many of these jobs will never

One claim that is incredibly irksome to me is that he will save the auto industry and restore it to its past glory. The last time I looked he was a few years too late. As a matter of fact, a good percentage of those manufacturing jobs created in the last six years can be directly attributed to the domestic auto industry! AND the people that are most responsible for that success are the autoworkers themselves, the people that took sacrifices during the bankruptcies to insure that there would be future jobs available. AND let's not forget that President Obama stuck his political neck out for us and we should forever be thankful for his courage and leadership during that crisis.

The auto industry is healthier today than it's been in decades and Trump and the rest of the Republican Party can take none of the credit. Trump's anti-trade rhetoric is fear mongering at its worst! Don't fall for it!

More than 6.8 million women in the United States are part of a union. In the fall of 2015, the AFL-CIO launched a comprehensive survey to better un-



derstand the experiences and aspirations of working women. Nearly 25,000 working women responded in just six weeks.

The National Survey of Working Women is more than just a job assessment. It zeroes in on how working women spend time at home, tackle financial challenges and engage in our communities. The results paint a clear picture of the economy and society working women are committed to building: where equal pay, paid leave and fair scheduling are the law of the land.

The AFL-CIO received so much information they decided to release the findings in a series of short reports over a few months. The first one presents a snapshot of the entire sample. have the ability to form a government of the people and for the people. Central to that is the right to vote.

Unfortunately, this man is not alone in his failure to vote. Every election cycle, millions of eligible voters stay home and abandon their rights. Sadly, too many of the citizens who fail to exercise their voter rights represent those groups-women and minorities-who had to fight the longest and hardest battles to gain this precious right. It seems unconscionable that anyone who truly believes themselves to be a patriot and lover of this country would not vote.

I have heard many excuses for not voting. One of the most common is the idea that voting does not matter. Really? In 2008 a Senate race in Minnesota came down to less than 200 votes out of over three million. Right here locally a State Representative vote was almost as close. The 2000 presidential election came down to a tiny number of highly contested votes in Florida. So each vote matters, and this is especially important for progressives and Democrats, who in this state have a substantial majority of eligible voters and generally win and lose based completely on turnout.

Another excuse for not voting that I hear frequently is that all politicians are the same and that the system is rigged, or some other term. First of all, not all politicians are the same, and the parties are not the same either. If you cannot tell the difference between two candidates, you are not looking very damn hard. Even within parties, people have different views, backgrounds, and records; across party lines the gulf is huge. If you cannot tell the difference between what the Democrats and Republicans stand for, I weep for you.

As for the system being rigged and controlled by the moneyed interests, which too often it is, do you think this happened by accident? No, it was the election of right-wing pro-business Republicans, starting in the 1980's, that caused this. Corporate America and its leaders supported and helped elect those who would wipe away limits on spending and regulation on business in all areas, but it was the misguided and apathetic electorate that allowed this to happen. Remember, no matter how many millions the DeVos family or Koch brothers spend on elections, every DeVos or Koch only gets one vote, same as you and me.

Want to change the direction of the state? Do away with right-to-work? Get rid of emergency managers and corporate tax cuts? If so, your vote, and those of your friends and family, do matter. The last four years have seen a concerted effort by Republicans across this country to make it more difficult to vote and to suppress voter turn-out. They know they are in the minority, they know that they represent the few against the many. Why else engage in systematic voter suppression?

So you want to show true patriotism? Use the rights brave men and women fought and died for and go to the polls and elect those candidates who support working families, our communities, and the power of the people, not the power of corporations.

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

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


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
