Keep work in the U.S.A.

I would like to share the following

letter that was sent to President Obama by our Regional Director Duane Zuckschwerdt. Our thanks to our director, and remember that we all must contact our representatives to ask for their



help in keeping our factories and industrial base in this country. President Barack Obama

I am writing to express my concerns regarding proposed changes to the General Motors Corporation. These changes will affect not only the UAW members of Region 1-C for whom I have direct responsibility, but also the communities in which they reside.

From the information I have received, it is evident that GM will be focusing on moving more of its production outside of the United States at the expense of American jobs. It is also reported that within the next five years GM plans on importing 5,251,028 vehicles into the United States which is a 23% increase in their current levels.

Considering the normal capacity of an assembly facility, this number equates to four US assembly plants, the same number that GM plans to close by year's end. If this happens, we will also lose countless supplier facilities as they will be forced to close or move into bankruptcy protection.

History has shown that when a facility is closed, it is gone *forever* taking along potential employment opportunities in the community and the tax base. Once these plants are gone and sales start to improve, current trade laws will allow GM to dramatically increase the amount of imports into our country to meet consumer demand. The source of these imports will come from low-cost countries where GM has made significant investments,

While UAW members work tirelessly to protect jobs in this country, GM has been the recipient of \$13.4 billion of federal assistance at the same time they were shifting production *out* of the country. For example, GM is preparing to transfer the next generation of the Cadillac SRX to Mexico from its current home in my Region, the Lansing Grand River Assembly plant. This troubles me greatly since many of our members are permanently laid-off from this facility. As you know, our state leads the nation in unemployment at 12.6% and many analysts expect that number to increase.

Also troubling me is the forgotten group in all of the discussions pertaining to a potential GM bankruptcy, our retirees. While there are more than 350,000 GM retirees and surviving spouses living in the United States, in my region

alone we have over 58,000. These retirees rely solely on their pension and health care (VEBA) to survive. Many are in their 50's and therefore are not eligible for Medicare or Social Security benefits. They worked 30 years or more and were enticed to leave through special attrition programs that allow GM to hire new employees at reduced pay and benefits.

If GM is allowed to file bankruptcy, these retirees are faced with a severely reduced pension and no health care coverage. They will be forced to look for work in an economy that is currently turning away young people with college degrees in droves.

While the direct impact will be on the auto industry, the indirect impact will affect every segment of the community, including the health care industry and government-provided programs that are currently overutilized and underfunded. Primary care physicians are reporting that office calls have significantly declined as people who have lost their health insurance can no longer afford preventive medical treatment. Hospitals in my region are already reporting that they are burdened with more and more people turning to emergency room visits for primary health care. If the 58,000 GM retirees in Region 1-C lose their health care, the situation will only worsen.

Mr. President, I am asking you to use your influence to do the right thing and help save an AMERICAN industry and AMERICAN jobs. UAW members believed your campaign promises. We believed that you were the change this country so desperately needed and we rallied on your behalf. Our tax dollars support our elected officials and our government and now we are asking that you stand in support of us. Do not allow GM or your task force (with no experience in the auto industry) the use of our hard-earned tax dollars to shutter more American factories, only to import more foreign, vehicles placing more AMERI-CANS out of work. We cannot continue to be a nation of consumption only. We must save our remaining manufacturing base. President Obama, you are our only hope. Please don't let us down.


Yet today, most people don't know who she was. But more than 6 million households have reason to offer her their thanks. - AFL-CIO




